Living Between Memory and Hope....During this past year I have been reading/studying/praying the Psalms and noting the often stating of God’s steadfast love for us. (hesed = steadfast love = Amazing Grace)

Psalm 136 says “**remember** the events of God’s steadfast love in our lives.”
 Psalm 103 says “**don’t forget** God’s Amazing Grace in our lives.” Psalm 126 places us **Between our Memory** of God’s Amazing Grace and our **Hope** for future times of experiencing God’s Amazing Grace. We had an orientation with the new Emeriti Faculty on March 28, 2022, in the SPU Library Seminar Room co-sponsored by the SPU Emeriti and Office of the Provost. We also invited retirees from 2020 and 2021 since we had not been meeting in person in those years.

Welcome New Emeriti

This year at the May Retirement Dinner, we welcomed nine new Emeriti. You can find full descriptions at www.spu.edu. All together they taught at SPU for more than 275 years.



Miriam Adenay, PhD, 46 years at SPU, Associate professor world Christian studies, introduced generations of students to the richness of the global Christian faith. She continues to be a global Christian leader who advocates for global equality for women of all faiths. She earned the Lifetime Achievement Award from Christians for Biblical Equity. She authored nine books and over 150 articles and also served as president of the American Society of Missiology.



Tom Amorose, PhD, Professor of English, came to SPU in 1996 to serve as the first director of Campus Writing, a role he kept for 16 years. His publications in the areas of writing-program administration at small colleges and universities have been anthologized and used as the basis for at least one national conference. But Amorose's first love, early English literature, has been the steady rhythm in his teaching throughout his career. His senior-level course on Shakespeare has helped many graduating English majors use the Bard of Avon's plays as a lens to look back on their college experiences and forward into their post-graduate lives.



Bruce Baker, PhD, Associate Professor of Business, 13 years at SPU. Had careers as a tech entrepreneur, corporate executive, ordained minister, and scholar, Baker is that rare "quadruple-threat" professor. His teaching and writing explore intersection of technology, culture, business, and ethics all through a theological lens. His scholarship translates biblical concepts such as gleaning and spiritual disciplines into modern business practices. Current research focuses on ethical/spiritual issues related to artificial intelligence. On boards of AI and Faith, Scholar-Leaders International, and Reconciliation.



John Bond, EdD, Professor of Educational Administration and Supervision, 14 Years. Bond joined the School of Education faculty in 2008 as a professor in the Educational Leadership Department after 36 years in the Northshore School District. His primary role has been teaching principal and superintendent certification courses, supervising interns, and engaging with public school leaders throughout the state. He authored or coauthored 20 articles and book chapters, along with many presentations at professional conferences. Recently he served as the department chair and as a doctoral faculty member.



Robert Drov Dahl, PhD, Professor of Educational Ministry, 40 years. In his decades at SPU, Drov Dahl has been a 4.0 undergraduate student, member of the wrestling team, director of Camp Casey, professor, member and a chair of numerous faculty committees, acting dean, and associate dean. He received the President's Award for Excellence and Faculty Service Award, and was named Top Prof by Ivy Honorary and Advisor of the Year. His service as a longstanding member and past president of the National Association of Professors of Christian Education testifies to his leadership in the discipline. He will enjoy his retirement with his wife, two grown children and five grandchildren.



Alberto Ferreiro, PhD, Professor of History. Since Dr. Ferreiro joined the History Department 36 years ago, he authored over 200 academic publications on European medieval history, including 12 books. Notably, his *Ancient Christian Commentary* (Vol. 14: *The Twelve Prophets*) has been published in a half-dozen languages. Ferreiro has taught at least 230 classes. Between 1989 and 2019, he took over 900 students from SPU and other universities to study at the University of Salamanca, Spain. A university in Lisbon, Portugal, dedicated a section of the library in honor of Ferreiro for donating his prized book collection.

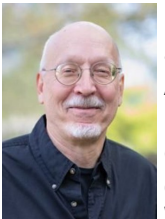
Newly retired faculty continued...



Sharleen Kato ED D, Professor of Human Development and Family Studies, 36 Years. Dr. Kato has been an exemplary and grace-filled member of the Department of Family and Consumer Sciences including Director. Highlights include program development, global studies, scholarly publications, and significant service to department, University, professional associations, and community. She created a new major, Human Development and Family Studies, and oversaw the FCS Secondary Education program. She developed the Philippines study abroad program, spearhead the minor in Global Development, senior international officer in the Office of Global Engagement, and represented international interests for the Washington Association of Family and Consumer Sciences (WAFCS) in the International Federation of Home Economics. Since 2013, she has authored 10 textbooks. Kato received the 2021 WA State Leader Award from WAFCS, Faculty Servant Award in 2020, and the 2015 FCS Alumna of the Year.



Robin O'Leary, Professor of Mathematics, PhD, 32 Years of Service. Since her 1990 arrival, O'Leary has faithfully served the SPU community and Mathematics Department. A three-time department chair, she also served on Faculty Status Committee, Faculty Budget, Stewardship Committee and Faculty Affairs Committee. She has blessed the community time and again with her musical talents, playing cello and singing for community events. Her students will tell you that she is both demanding and fair, demonstrating genuine care for them not only as learners but also as people. Many will never forget how she used Jell-O to teach calculus! She taught more than 20 different classes and developed many of them.



Mark Walhout, PhD, Professor of English | 35 Years. In 1987, after a BA from Wheaton College and an MA and PhD from Northwestern University, Mark Walhout brought his expertise in American literature and literary criticism to SPU. An avid reader, Walhout has frequently published reviews in *Books and Culture*, and has accrued ever-broadening academic and cultural interests, including post-9/11 fiction, fictionalized biographies of Jesus, literary hoaxes and plagiarism, Christian academic freedom, and the work of postcolonial critic Edward Said. Walhout's latest work is a dual biography of Said and Charles Malik, titled *Arab Intellectuals and American Power* (2020). Walhout served as the chair of the English Department for over 20 years. .

Ed Bauman

January 10, 2022

From humble beginnings in Bird Island, Minnesota, Ed Bauman went on to be a powerful change agent for the Lord Jesus Christ in the lives of countless engineering students over a long professional career. As a friend, boss, and mentor, Ed has had an incalculable positive impact on me and my family. His humble example as a servant leader has left a legacy of blessing and empowerment to those he led. All his faculty colleagues have benefited from his gentle and effective leadership.

After a full career in the Air Force, rising to the rank of Lieutenant Colonel, and teaching at the U.S. Air Force Academy and the University of Colorado at Colorado Springs, he chose to continue pursuing his vision of a Christian engineering program. That was realized when he came to SPU in 1985 and crafted an electrical engineering program from the foundations laid by such advocates as Jim Crichton, Hugh Nutley, and Bob Hughson. He soon forged strategic partnerships with local industry partners including Fluke, Boeing, and many others whereby students could participate in invaluable internship experiences working alongside professionals in companies and making significant technical contributions before graduation. Often this led to full time employment, including such noteworthy graduates as my son-in-law and nephew! Graduates have followed in his footsteps to be college professors and even Director of SPU's Engineering and Computer Science programs. Others have gone on to be major influencers in aerospace, national security, national defense, the VA, consumer products, communications, robotics, artificial intelligence, academics, manufacturing, chip design and manufacturing, and other key areas.

Ed foresaw the need to equip young people with a strong Scriptural undergirding so they could truly be salt and light as professionals. He wanted to see them encouraged and strengthened so that they themselves could be change agents for good. This was in full keeping with his stated vision for the SPU engineering programs from the beginning: to help prepare students to effectively live out their faith in the professional workplace. He modeled the Christian professional to his students and colleagues. He shared his "Thot for Lifetime" virtually in every class – short, potent mini-lessons based on Scripture or some other inspiring quote to aid them in developing vision for their lives. This received copious appreciation from students.

Retirement from SPU did not prevent him from being the 'continuing Ed' I knew him to be! After moving to Ocean Shores, he and his wife Betty continued to minister to young people in their church and in the local public schools. He led the development of an academic mentorship/tutoring program in the schools to help those students who needed an extra boost. He and Betty also generously helped their church construct a new facility for youth.

Throughout his career Ed sought to mentor, encourage and challenge young people to strive for excellence and serve God in their chosen professions. At the Air Force Academy, he and Betty had cadets in their home weekly for fun, fellowship, and Bible study. They also became personally involved with individuals who needed extra support, leading them to Christ and even housing them during a time of special need. Herman Plott, former SPU engineering colleague and hired by Ed as the second electrical engineering professor in the new program, told me that, as a boss, Ed was an exceptional example, and we could be very thankful. Herman himself had worked for a wide variety of people and employed others as well as a small business owner.

After losing Betty a few years ago, Ed struggled with various health issues that made it difficult for him, but he continued to make inspiring contributions to his family, his church, and his community. One of his favorite Bible verses was Matthew 6:33: "But seek first the kingdom of God and His righteousness and all these things will be added to you as well." I believe Ed did this to the best of his ability. He is now home!

V.O. "Bud" McDole passed away peacefully at age 92 on April 19, 2022 after a short stint with Acute Leukemia. He was born in Monterey Park, CA, on December 14, 1929. His early years were spent near Vancouver and then Bothell, WA. He spent many hours with friends and family over the years, enjoying being outdoors and hunting and fishing. After his hunting years, he focused on the wild Snow Geese that migrate to Skagit Valley every winter. He studied them, wrote articles about them published in The Herald and led tours for others in the retirement community.

He married Ruth Lucille Capp in 1950 after meeting at SPU and began his work career at IBM as a Sales Executive that spanned 32 years. They raised 5 children during their 59 years together, all of whom attended SPU. He thoroughly enjoyed being involved in the lives of his 10 grandchildren.

He devoted much time his entire life to supporting Seattle Pacific University. He served on the Board of Trustees for 24 years, 12 years as Chairman. He was a fervent participant and co-founder of the Falcon Club at Seattle Pacific and attended basketball games regularly with his wife, Lucy. For his significant and distinguished service to SPU, Bud was recognized as an Emeritus Trustee in 1995, given an honorary Doctor of Humane Letters in 1996, presented a Medallion Award in 2002, and awarded the Falcons Hall of Fame Lifetime Achievement award in 2007.

At 92, he was still active in his Warm Beach Senior Community planning and participating in musical events, previously serving on the Residents Council, Community Board and assisting with the "Lights of Christmas". He loved gardening and helped to landscape much of the grounds around the Senior Community as well as create and maintain the Orchid garden on campus. He was predeceased by his first wife, Lucille in 2010, and his eldest daughter Heather in 2020.

In 2011 he married Mary Belle Timm. He is survived by his current wife, Mary Belle Timm McDole, his four remaining children, Kevyn (Mike) Vinson of Canton, GA, Tamara McDole Whitney of Seattle, Gregory (Lorri) McDole of Renton, and Randall (Kerry) McDole of Bend, OR.
